

ICCRP Overview



About

The International & Canadian Child Rights Partnership (ICCRP) was formed in 2015. Through [our prior work on the interconnections of children's rights to participation and protection](#), the ICCRP identified a critically overlooked element in realizing child rights: **intergenerational relationships**. The expanded ICCRP will now focus on this new, innovative research direction to examine how intergenerational relationships can transcend current barriers to implementing **children's rights**, through intergenerational partnerships, in research, policy, and practice.

The Expanded ICCRP

Alongside project director (PD) [Dr. Tara Collins](#), project manager (PM) **Vanessa Zufelt**, and Child and Youth Participation Coordinator **Sachi Shukul** from X University (Ryerson), the ICCRP includes **young people** with lived experience, **39 researchers**, and **30 partner organizations** from universities, NGOs, major human rights institutions, and governments in Canada and in multiple countries across the Americas, Africa, Europe, Asia, and Oceania.

Primary Research Question

How can intergenerational relationships contribute to, challenge, and transcend barriers to realizing child rights?

Research Objectives

1. Expand conceptual models for intergenerational partnerships;
2. Investigate processes for fostering intergenerational partnerships to support child rights, including youth activism;
3. Identify and develop relational practices (intergenerational, decolonial, cross-national, cross-cultural, ethical) that can reform and stimulate research, public policy, and practice to support child rights; and
4. Explore and analyze child rights education environments and how they support or hinder understanding of child rights among children, as well as intergenerational partnerships.

Governance & Advisory Groups



Steering Committee (SC)

The SC is the ICCRP's **primary decision-making body** where all key information related to RSs, WGs, and ACs is received and communicated across the project. It visions and **leads partnership activities** including: research development, implementation, and assessment, operations, budget management, resource allocation, hiring staff, dispute resolution, monitoring process and progress, and timely production of deliverables.

Working Groups (WGs)

Our **four WGs** are integral to the **research processes in all RSs**, as key vehicles for **synthesis of case-study data** and incisive application of our theoretical approach of relational child rights. Each RS and WG has been discreetly developed to include young people, expert and emerging researchers, practitioners, policymakers, and a diverse mix of co-applicants, collaborators, and partners, as well as geographies and generations.

WGs guide case studies in relation to the following four themes: ethics, participatory methods, conceptual interconnections, and policy.

Intergenerational Advisory Committee (IAC)

IAC members have been carefully chosen to augment ICCRP expertise, perspectives, and best practices for **intergenerational partnerships**. Members are Canadian and international **young people and adults**, who meet biannually, to provide intergenerational advice to the SC on directions and processes of the ICCRP. The IAC includes 8 adult CoLs and 14 young people from case study projects and partners. **Child and Youth IAC Members:** Still to be recruited.

Partners Advisory Committee (PAC)

The PAC works closely with the SC to advise on research directions to ensure that the ICCRP maintains its focus on research, policy, and practice and **remains responsive to partner contexts and priorities**.

It plays a crucial role in supporting the interpretation and relevance of findings from **the perspectives of national and international organizations** directly involved in children's rights research, policy, and practice. **Confirmed Partners Include:** Families Canada, Int'l Child Protection Network of Canada, Plan Canada, Terre des Hommes, Eurochild, IICRD, World Vision, & others.

Knowledge Mobilization Committee (KMbC)

The KMbC includes team members with extensive relevant expertise and access to stakeholder networks, who **facilitate multidirectional, national and international flow of knowledge** across academia and society, furthering intellectual exchange with partners, researchers, young people, and practitioners. At any given moment, at least 5 IAC youth members and 5 partners also sit on the KMbC to inform KMb approaches to **advance academic, practitioner and youth-accessible KMb**.

Intergenerational Partnerships (IPs)

IPs are about adults and young people **working together** to learn from each other's expertise, knowledge and experiences. The ICCRP believes that we need **both adults and children** to address and understand children's rights.



What is SSHRC?

The Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council ([SSHRC](#)) is the federal research funding agency of Canada that promotes and supports research and research training in the humanities and social sciences.

Partnership Grants support formal partnerships between academic researchers, businesses and other partners that will advance knowledge and understanding on critical issues of intellectual, social, economic and cultural significance. In 2021, the ICCRP officially began work on its seven-year SSHRC partnership grant (PG).
